## Changes in school from 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2024

Upon our return we will be spending time reminding students in Years 7 to 10 of some basic routines and expectations of them which are required from all students as they help make the school a purposeful and welcoming environment for all students and staff. This will range from simple routines like why we kept the one-way system inside the building during lesson changeovers (and therefore why all students need to use it) to more complex issues like the impact lateness to lessons has on a teacher and other students (and therefore why students need to use the 5 minute movement time to arrive at their lessons on time). A very small group of students, mainly but not exclusively female, have developed the habit of skipping lessons - a behaviour I know from my Head networks that secondary schools are experiencing nationwide. It is counter-productive behaviour. After working with these students and their families, a sub-group of them continue to do it, sadly. They, and some others who seem to find it unreasonable to personally meet the expectations of behaviour in lessons which most





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other students easily achieve, will be educated and supervised elsewhere in school for several weeks after January. Families impacted by this will be contacted individually.

Although it is rare at Highcliffe, persistent bullying impacts a student who experiences it. Students who choose to engage in such behaviour, and their parents, should not be surprised at the robust response of the school, which will typically involve suspension/s, perhaps a Managed Move to another school, and has even involved the permanent exclusion of students who continue to bully despite the support and sanctions given to them to change their behaviour. Students are telling us the ban on mobile phones has helped encourage positive face-to-face interactions and that awareness levels and self-restraint about derogatory language have continued to markedly improve. External reviews carried out by HISP MAT over the term confirm this. It is never nice to have to tell a parent their child is bullying another child; changing that behaviour becomes more achievable when parents do not blame others for their child's own choices.

Regarding mobile phones, students deserve hearty congratulation for embracing this change so successfully and adapting their behaviour. This includes our Sixth Form, who have really impressed us with their voluntary self-restraint from using their phones in front of younger students. Going phone-free has proven a welcome and straightforward change. Thank you, parents, for your support of this at home.
